Christopher had an enormous collection of proprietary material that, unfortunately, he never used without citation. He had many fascinating details about Houdini’s aviation endeavors that we cite in good faith.

4. page 239. **Houdini’s acquaintance Alberto Santos Dumont...** For background on Santos-Dumont see <http://www.earlyaviators.com/edumonb.htm> , a website that chronicles the achievements of the early pioneers of aviation. Houdini met Santos-Dumont on a ship to the U.S. from Europe. The sheet that Santos-Dumont autographed for Houdini, and that Houdini annotated “We crossed to America with S. Dumont” is in the Harry Ransom Center, University of Texas at Austin. Houdini and Santos-Dumont had a mutual friend in Lord Northcliffe and Northcliffe had dinner with Santos-Dumont the night before Houdini and the aviator sailed for the U.S.

5. page 239. **His plan was to be handcuffed...in Piccadilly Circus.** This story is related in Milbourne Christopher, *Houdini: A Pictorial Biography* (New York: Gramercy Books, 1976), page 62. Christopher reports that his information came from two English newspaper articles, unfortunately he doesn't give an exact citation.
